## Good Student to Teacher Ratios Observed in 103 Government Schools

- Majority of teachers and students have above 75% attendance
- 89 girls' primary schools without security guards, 131 without sanitary workers

Good student to teacher ratios were observed in 103 out of 147 state run girls' primary schools monitored nationwide in October. The quality of education imparted to students at educational institutions is dependent on several factors, including the number of students in a given class. Greater numbers of students in a single classroom at any given time reduces the capacity of the teacher to engage and interest all of the students and does not exploit their full potential. In 67 schools in Punjab, on average, one teacher was available to 34 students, and in 36 schools in Sindh, on average, one teacher was available to 27 students. However, on average, 40 students were the responsibility of one teacher in 29 schools in KP, 41 in 12 schools in Balochistan and 72 in three schools in FATA. Attendance of teachers was between 76% and 100% at 77% of the monitored schools while the same attendance ratio was maintained by students at 63% schools.

Nationwide, 41 teaching posts were vacant in 137 monitored schools which shared this information. With regard to non-teaching staff, 131 schools did not have sanitary workers. However, 132 were found to be clean, hinting they were cleaned by the students themselves. Eighty nine schools did not have security guards while 17 were without boundary walls. This is a serious issue given that girls' educational institutions are under greater threat from terrorists.

At least 80% schools out of the 147 monitored in October did not have staff-rooms for teachers. There were no desks and chairs for students in 48% of the schools while a fifth didn't have any for teachers. Nineteen schools nationwide lacked black/white boards and 44% did not have arrangements for clean drinking water for students. Moreover, despite the acknowledged importance of physical education and exercise for both girls and boys, two-thirds of the monitored schools lacked playgrounds for students.

Forty schools nationwide were without electricity while 67% of those in Balochistan, at least 30% in Punjab and Sindh and 17% in KP did not have fans. In addition, 23 schools were not well-lit. In the absence of electricity it is especially important that classrooms be well lit.

Greater government oversight is needed to monitor and rectify lack of crucial non-teaching staff like security guards and other considerations of physical infrastructure. Elected representatives and governments officials made 92 visits to 147 schools in the past three months. Two visits were made by Members of National Assembly (MNAs), both to schools in Punjab, while one was made by a Member of Provincial Assembly (MPA), also in the same province. Other elected representatives (ex-nazims etc.) made five visits, all in Punjab. The Executive District Officers/Education made 23 visits. Other government officials made 61 visits.

FAFEN Governance Monitors visited 147 schools in 89 districts nationwide – 67 of them in 30 districts in Punjab, 36 in 23 districts in Sindh, 29 in 21 districts in KP, 12 in as many districts in Balochistan and three in as many agencies in FATA.

## 1. Physical Infrastructure

Of the 147 schools monitored nationwide in October, at least 80% in Punjab, Sindh and KP, 92% in Balochistan and all three in FATA did not have staff-rooms. All schools monitored in FATA, three-quarters of those in Balochistan, at least half in Punjab and KP and 14% in Sindh did not have desks and chairs for students. Thirty two schools – 13 in Punjab, 10 in KP, six in Balochistan and three in Sindh did not have chairs and tables for teachers. Nineteen schools lacked black/white boards – 10 in Punjab, five in Balochistan, three in Sindh and one in FATA.

While 142 of the 147 monitored girls' primary schools were housed in proper buildings, there were 15 schools in Punjab, five in Sindh, four in KP, two in Balochistan and one in FATA that were not clean. In addition, nine schools in Punjab, four in KP and two each in Sindh and Balochistan did not have boundary walls

Forty schools nationwide were without electricity – 17 in Punjab, 10 in Sindh, nine in Balochistan, three in KP and one in FATA. Sixty seven percent schools in Balochistan, at least 30% in Punjab and Sindh and 17% in KP did not have fans. Eleven schools in Punjab, eight in Balochistan and two each in Sindh and KP were not well-lit.

Two-thirds of the monitored schools lacked playgrounds for students – 42 in Punjab, 22 in KP, 20 in Sindh, 11 in Balochistan and two in FATA. Since physical education and exercise are as important for girls as they are for boys, therefore, the girls too should be provided playgrounds. Forty four percent schools did not have arrangements for clean drinking water for students - all the schools monitored in Balochistan, at least 64% in Sindh and FATA and at least 28% in Punjab and KP.

Sanitary workers were not present in 131 schools on the day of FAFEN Governance Monitors' visit. Although some of them could be on leave on any given day, such a large number being absent on a single day is unlikely. This perhaps reflects the casual attitude of the hired non-teaching staff. However, despite the absence of 131 sweepers in the monitored schools, 120 were clean, indicating they were being cleaned by some other people, possibly the enrolled students. There were no peons present in 80 schools – 44 in Punjab, 16 in Sindh, nine each in KP and Balochistan and two in FATA. Moreover, security guards were not present in 98 schools – all monitored schools in Balochistan, 45 in Punjab, 23 in Sindh, 16 in KP and one in FATA. This is a serious issue given that girls' educational institutions are under greater threat from terrorists.

## Monitoring Methodology

The Free and Fair Election Network (FAFEN) has launched a nationwide initiative to monitor governance processes under its Supporting Transparency Accountability and Electoral Processes in Pakistan as part of its mandate to strengthen all forms of democratic accountabilities in Pakistan. Objective information about governance processes is vital to encourage informed engagement of citizenry with elected and public institutions for progressive outputs. FAFEN Governance Monitoring aims at enriching the public discourse and debate on governance and developing research-based recommendations for reforms.

FAFEN advocates for transparency, accountability, responsiveness, representativeness and public participation as essential elements of democratic governance to enhance the output, efficiency and effectiveness of all elected and public institutions.

FAFEN Governance Monitors visit schools and colleges, health facilities, police stations and other public institutions to monitor and evaluate their efficiency and efficacy in 200 National Assembly constituencies of 119 districts in Punjab, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, Balochistan, Sindh, Federally Administered Tribal Areas (FATA) and Islamabad Capital Territory (ICT). In addition, FAFEN is also monitoring complaints handling mechanisms of various public institutions to gauge their effectiveness.

Trained FAFEN Governance Monitors fill out standardized checklists during their monitoring visits, employing interviewing and observation techniques, and then transmit the data to the FAFEN Secretariat in Islamabad for data entry, cleaning and analysis. FAFEN plans to produce monthly thematic reports such as this one. This information will also contribute to FAFEN Bi-Annual State of Governance in Pakistan Reports.

FAFEN Governance Monitoring reports are based on non-probability sampling, and their findings should not be considered national or provincial generalizations. However, FAFEN's outreach across the country allows it to access most districts as well as urban and rural areas. Standardized methodology is applied across Pakistan to draw information in a uniform way through observation and interviewing. The observation and interviews are recorded on a standardized checklist. All information received at the FAFEN Secretariat is verified through multiple sources for authenticity and accuracy. These reports provide data analysis and inferences only for the monitored institutions within the sample. These reports are meant to present to relevant stakeholders a consolidated and current snapshot of the state of governance in public institutions in order to inspire public dialogue and as a contribution towards targeted interventions and reforms.

However, FAFEN's unique methodology to assess and evaluate governance processes continues to evolve. Any inaccuracies that may be noticed in the data or suggestions for improvement in the methodology can be sent to the email address at the end of this report.

## 2.0 Appointment of Teaching and Non-Teaching Staff

FAFEN Governance Monitors request the administration of each monitored school to share information on the appointments of teaching and non-teaching staff made against sanctioned posts.

### 2.1 Appointment of Teaching Staff

Ten schools withheld information on appointments of teachers made against the sanctioned posts – seven in Sindh, two in KP and one in Punjab. Nationwide, 41 teaching posts were vacant in 137 monitored schools which shared this information – 20 posts each were vacant in schools in Punjab and Sindh, five in Balochistan and two in FATA. However, 242 teachers were appointed in schools in KP against a sanctioned strength of 236.

## 2.2 Appointment of Non-Teaching Staff

Three-quarters of the schools monitored in Balochistan and at least 40% in Punjab and Sindh withheld information on sanctioned posts for non-teaching staff. Two schools in KP did not share information on sanctioned posts of non-teaching staff. With the exception of schools sharing information in Balochistan and FATA, where all posts sanctioned for non-teaching staff were filled, six positions in schools in Sindh, three in Punjab and one in KP were vacant.

## 3. Students-per-Teacher

On average, one teacher was available for 34 students in the 147 schools monitored across the country. This ratio was maintained in 67 schools monitored in Punjab. However, in Sindh, 27 students were the responsibility of one teacher, 40 in KP, 41 in Balochistan and 72 in FATA. It is nearly impossible for a single teacher to ensure all students reach their maximum potential if they are responsible for such a large number, e.g. in FATA and to a lesser extent, in KP and Balochistan. This in turn reflects on the quality of education imparted to students and their future educational career.

## 4. Teachers' Attendance

Nationwide, teachers at 113 out of 147 schools maintained an attendance ratio of 76% to 100%. This attendance prevailed among teachers in 51 schools in Punjab, 27 each in Sindh and KP, eight in Balochistan and two in FATA. Teachers at 11 schools in Punjab, seven in Sindh, three in Balochistan and one each in KP and FATA had attendances between 51% and 75%, while four schools in Punjab, two in Sindh and one each in KP and Balochistan had attendances between 26% and 50%. Teachers' attendance was below 25% in one school monitored in Punjab.

## 5. Students' Attendance

Nationwide, students' attendance was between 76% and 100% in 44 schools in Punjab, 24 in KP, 16 in Sindh, seven in Balochistan and two in FATA – 93 in all. Students' attendance was between 51% and 75% at 42 schools – 20 in Punjab, 13 in Sindh, five in KP, three in Balochistan and one in FATA. Students at six schools in Sindh and two each in Punjab and Balochistan had attendances between 26% and 50%, while in one school each in Punjab and Sindh students' attendance fell below 25%.

## 6. Government Oversight

Elected representatives and government officials made 92 visits to 147 schools in the past three months. Two visits were made by Members of National Assembly (MNAs), both to schools in Punjab, while one was made by a Member of Provincial Assembly (MPA), also in Punjab. Other elected representatives (ex-nazims etc.) made five visits, all in Punjab. The Executive District Officer/Education made 23 visits – nine in Punjab, seven in KP, four in Sindh, two in Balochistan and one in FATA. Other government officials made 61 visits – 42 in Punjab, 13 in Sindh and six in KP.

Free and Fair Election Network (FAFEN), established in 2006, is a coalition of 42 leading civil society organizations, working to strengthen all forms of democratic accountabilities in Pakistan. Governed by Trust for Democratic Education and Accountability, FAFEN's key achievements are:

- Observed the public display of Pakistan's draft electoral rolls and conducted the country's first statistically-valid voters' list audit in 2007
- Deployed more than 18,829 trained, neutral Election Day observers nationwide to watch the February 18, 2008 polls and 264 long-term observers to monitor the pre-election process
- Fielded long-term observers nationwide and published 19 pre-election reports
- For the February 18, 2008, General Elections, FAFEN conducted 260 simultaneous Parallel Vote Tabulations (PVTs)- the largest effort in the world
- Conducted its first survey, Constituents Aspirations Survey, in December 2008 with a sample size of 3,124 respondents to get the description of the state of public opinion and also to get a deeper understanding of the values, attitudes and beliefs of people living in the constituencies
- Conducted mapping of organizations working for human rights within Pakistan
- Observed general elections at Gilgit-Baltistan in 2009 and by-elections in various constituencies of the Punjab, Balochistan and Khyber Pakhtunkhwa in 2010
- Implemented a unique methodology to observe parliamentary proceedings under its Parliamentary Watch Project
- Monitors public institutions across Pakistan and issues monthly reports on the state and performance of educational, health and other local level institutions. In addition, monthly reports on prices, crimes, incidence of disease, caseload in lower courts and political and electoral violence are issued.

FAFEN continues to implement robust programs in-between elections related to monitoring parliamentary affairs, connecting constituents to their elected representatives, monitoring the performance of public and elected institutions and advocating electoral and democratic reforms. FAFEN is also monitoring political and electoral violence, peace activities and promoting active citizenry through ongoing civic education activities across the country. FAFEN is currently implementing Supporting Transparency, Accountability and Electoral Processes in Pakistan (STAEP) in 200 National Assembly constituencies in 119 districts across Pakistan.



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
